

Arc3 Pty Ltd is the successful tenderer to complete the yet unfinished building. The new site manager will be onsite within two weeks with the anticipated start date end of January 2024.

There is further news. The new cover over the entrance to the Junior School is expected to be built and completed during January 2024.

In addition to the above there is more great news. The process for identifying an architect to design a new building, to replace Building A,- has commenced. It is hoped that the planning process will be completed during first term and building works will commence late July / August.

In addition to your efforts including contacting your local member we have had great support through Mr. Jeff Kennet. Attendance – We value your presence at school.

Heatherwood School prioritises school attendance and we promote the notion that every day of school counts. We work in partnership with families to promote high levels of attendance and to investigate underlying factors that may be contributing to low levels of attendance or a reluctance of students to come to school.

Teachers investigate absences of 2 or more consecutive days in order to understand the reason behind the absence and to offer any assistance that may be required to help students return to school as soon as possible.

If a pattern of absence begins to emerge, we work with families to establish an attendance plan, including setting attendance goals and any make necessary adjustments to programs that are likely to promote attendance for that individual. We seek to make school a safe and engaging experience for all of our students so that school is a place where they feel welcome and want to be.

Here are some tips you may find helpful if your child is experiencing difficulties around school attendance:

* We want to work in partnership with parents – act early if you have any concerns by contacting us and asking for advice and support

* Talk positively about school and the importance of attending every day

- * Open and prompt communication with your child's school about all absences is a good idea
- * Avoid making routine medical and dental appointments during the school day or planning family

They marched in with the Australian Flag and lowered it to half mask. Mark Wray McCann oversaw the assembly and the presentation was led by Braham Morris. Deb Weinman spoke about he Legacy promise. Legacy is a charity to support the families of our veterans. Legacy stared in the trenches of the Western Front during World war1. When a soldier said to his dying mate "I'll look after the missus and the kids". This became known as the promise. Bebe Peters began the remembrance with the Wurundjeri Welcome to Country. The school captains Paris presented the Remembrance service which told the story of the unknown soldier and school Abby explained the origin of The Ode of Remembrance and Bebe presented the Ode. With heartfelt Paris discussed what Remembrance Day meant to her and Abby explained the story behind the red poppies. This term our senior students explored the mechanics of hydraulic systems. Working in small groups they followed detailed instructions to create Judobots, powered by water. They applied the principles of engineering that is, keeping it simple, using thought provoking processes and communicating efficiently. This is not always a simple task as the key to communication is being prepared to listen to the ideas of others.

After creating the base, stand, the arm and wedge our seniors constructed and tested the hydraulic system. This part proved to be problematic as they had to ensure they did not have any air bubbles within the tubing. With persistence and focus all our students completed the task well. After decorating and naming our Judobots all our students prepared for the battle of the bots. Each group must try to tip over the bot of another group.

POLICE-CYBER SAFETY Deb Weinmann





BEHAVIOUR SUPPORT

School Wide Positive Behaviour Support (SWPBS)

Vision Statement: To provide a safe and engaging learning environment for each student at our school.

SWPBS is a systems approach to creating the kind of school where all students are successful and included. This is achieved through teaching and reinforcing positive behaviours that align with our three core school values.

- 1. Be Respectful
- 2. Be Your Best
- 3. Be Safe.

The purpose of SWPBS is to identify the effective, efficient, and evidence based supports we can put in place to ensure all students experience success. The evidence based features of SWPBS include:

- prevention
- defining and teaching positive social expectations
- acknowledging positive behaviour
- arranging consistent responses to all behaviour
- maintaining ongoing collection and use of data for decision making
- establishing a continuum of interventions
- celebrating individual and whole school achievement.

Heatherwood SWPBS Ticket System

The ticket system is a key feature of Heatherwood's SWPBS approach as it provides a structure for acknowledging, reinforcing and collecting data on positive behaviours. Heatherwood's SWPBS Ticket System consists of the following steps:

Any staff member observes a student displaying a positive behaviour based on the school's values.
The staff member fills out an SWPBS ticket with the student's name and the value he/she has displayed.

3. The staff member awards the student the ticket, with verbal feedback on specific behaviour, for example, "Great work Kevin. I saw you including Jane in your game. You're really being RESPECTFUL".

4. The student gives the ticket to their classroom teacher to be added to their total.

5. At the end of the week, each student's tickets are counted and recorded.

6. Student achievement and milestones are recognised with the presentation of certificates at assemblies and individualised incentives through classroom teachers.

Congratulations Jasmine and good luck with your future soccer dreams!


